Dear Quondam Members,

This has been a busy and eventful school year. The eagerly awaited new rooms in the Gloucester Wing began to be used in the autumn term, when we took possession of the additional Art Studio on the top floor. By the beginning of the summer term, the entire building was complete, in good time for the official opening by His Royal Highness, The Duke of Gloucester on May 6th. Amongst the many Quondam members present that day, it was wonderful to welcome Mrs Pamela Parsonson and Miss Sifleet, Jennifer Anderson, Gwyneth Young and Alison Edelshain. At an open evening in June, one of our few male members of Quondam returned visit to the school; now grandfather to Ellie Marks, a pupil in the Thirds, he had been a pupil in the former prep school, when it still admitted boys.

As ever, charitable commitment continues to dominate much of the activity beyond classroom lessons. A significant number of sixth formers volunteer to help on a weekly basis in neighbouring primary schools and we value our ongoing link with the Jack Taylor School, for children with special learning needs, in Swiss Cottage. Last December, Miss Dickens, Head of Italian, accompanied by Ms Hack, Head of Geography, and a team of senior girls went to visit the school we are sponsoring in Moshi,

Tanzania and helped to paint some of the rooms! This July, for the third successive year, senior pupils and four members of staff devoted a week of their summer holidays to FHS Summer Camp: a residential activity holiday held at Sayers Croft in Surrey for children who are under the care of Westminster Social Services. Three fund-raising events stand out as high points amongst hundreds in the past year: the annual sponsored walk in Regent's Park undertaken by the whole school and many canine friends; a sponsored sky dive by some of the more intrepid teaching staff and several sixth formers; "FHS Has Talent" – our contestants which put the television programme in the shade!

Amongst the enormous number of extra-curricular activities this year, there were several new events, including a Science Fair for the Lower Fourths in late June and an extra summer term school play, The Tempest. The main school play last autumn term, directed by Miss Williamson was a superb production of Arcadia by Tom Stoppard: two casts performed twice in the four- night run. Our annual joint choral concert performance with Harrow School at the end of the Easter term was Walton's Belshazzar's Feast: thanks to indefatigable rehearsing by Mrs Rolfe Johnson, our choir rose to the challenge of this demanding and wonderful work. Sport continues to be a very important part of school life; four girls currently play county netball for Middlesex; other CG pupils are in the top ten nationally for sports such as ice-skating, swimming and skiing.

As ever, there were many visits and trips for students in every year of the school. However, amongst this year's more far-flung trips were a Geography trip to Iceland; a Spanish department trip to Gredos; a History department trip to Ypres and the WWI cemeteries and a ski trip to Canada.

I am indebted to the Quondam Committee, for their invaluable support of the school, in so many ways. It is always a huge pleasure for me to meet members of Quondam, not only at the annual Ouondam lunch in November. but also at other school functions. Following the success of last year's event, the Parents' Association will again be hosting a Christmas Fair in school on Saturday November 21st from 2 – 4pm: Christmas puddings, home-made cakes and a wonderful array of festive gifts will be available. It is always a pleasure to see Quondam members at the School Carol Service which will this year be held at St Cyprian's Church at 6.30pm on Tuesday 15th December. ST CYPRIAN'S APPEAL

APPEAL FOR THE CONSERVATION OF THE HIGH ALTAR AT SAINT CYPRIAN'S, CLARENCE GATE



You will remember the beauty of our neighbouring church, where all our services and many of our concerts have taken place over the years, and with which we have a very strong relationship.

The whole church, including the High Altar, was designed by Sir Ninian Comper and completed in 1903. Both the Dossal and Frontal (back and front) of the High Altar are in severe need of restoration, which is now being carried out. The grime and cracks in the paintwork on gesso which are the legacy of 106 years will disappear through cleaning and restoration so that the original colours and splendour of the gold are again brought out. The Frontal shows the tree in the Garden of Eden with Adam, Eve and the serpent, and the Dossal above and behind the Altar shows the tree's continuation

as the Tree of Life, with Christ on the Cross and the saints. The Dossal will then be suspended in such a way that it no longer has to bear its own weight, and both Dossal and Frontal will be varnished for protection for the future.

Dear Quondam,

I am writing this just a few days after returning from a fascinating trip to the Baltic states. As with any holiday, one of the great pleasures is getting to meet new people and I was very happy to have shared the often very moving and disturbing stories of what had happened during the war years in Lithuania and Latvia with another "polished corner". Joan Mushin (née Behrman) and her husband Alan were among the other members of our intrepid and enthusiastic party. It was a lovely opportunity to get to know Joan and the wonderful description of Joan's Class of 1958 Reunion can be found later in this magazine.

This year, for the school at least, has been dominated by the building and then completion of the new 'Gloucester Arms' wing. Quondam members were well represented at the official opening on the 6th May 2009 and many of us were privileged to be introduced to the Duke of Gloucester who officially opened the wing. It was a memorable day and the new wing's rooms looked extremely impressive.

Earlier in the year, we were busy judging the entries for the Quondam Travel Fund and the Essay Prizes. The Quondam Committee were very pleased to award the main Travel Fund prize to Marium Sherwani to assist her plans to research the effects of altitude in the Himalayas. Marium also intends to help teach English in the local villages on completion of her scientific research. The Committee also decided to award an additional sum to provide some support to Iona Denniston, who is volunteering in a babies' home in Uganda helping to care for some of the children orphaned through Aids.

The judging of the entries for the Essay Prizes was as hard as usual. This year we had moved away from the original travel theme and invited the girls to write on "My Hero / Heroine". We received some fascinating entries and the heroes and heroines celebrated ranged from the girls' parents and grandparents to local people who had done something exceptional as well as more well-known individuals such as Nelson Mandela and even Simon Cowell! After some very close voting among the Quondam Committee, the Junior Prize was awarded to Daphne Milner for her essay on Rosa Parks and the Senior Prize to Sophie de Beistegui for her essay on Philip Pullman. Our congratulations go to everyone who entered and especially to the winners. Next year's essay title will be "Time" and we look forward to reading some more excellent essays. The Committee also took the decision to raise the amount available for these prizes and it is hoped that the ±750 available for the Travel Fund and the ±50 and ±25 each for the Senior and Junior Essay prizes will further encourage some inspired entries.

The Quondam Committee were also sorry to learn that St Cyprian's, the school's local church, was struggling to find the £20,000 needed to repair its altar. Since there is such a long-standing and close relationship between the church and the school, the committee decided to not only make a £500 contribution towards the St Cyprian's fund, but to also offer a free advert in this magazine so old girls who wished to make an individual contribution or who could help with identifying sponsorship opportunities could help St Cyprians. As you can see, we have continued to improve the quality and content of this magazine. Under Nadia Demetriou Ladas' enthusiastic and discerning eye, the former "Newsletter" has become the "Polished Corners" magazine that you can see today. Our thanks to her for all her hard work. "I can quite easily put a date and place to the start of this memorable and glamorous reunion of the class of 1958. It is harder to track the gathering of momentum that led to the arrival of nine of us, mostly with our husbands. However the husbands were a big bonus, with their photographic skills, their baggage handling skills, their tolerance of our giggles and recognition that this was something really special in our lives. Janet brought her older sister Elizabeth Balcon (Puff Henry as was), who added a special dimension to our memories. Five years ahead of us, she was a contemporary of Penny Cove-Smith, Clare Hilton and Clare Tomlinson.

Almost all the credit for this remarkable reunion went to Rosemary. In December of 2007 at a lunch where Rosemary had flown in from New York and Diana from Australia, she remarked that a 50th reunion needed to be made into a special occasion. Our brains got into gear but nothing much surfaced until she said "well you could all come to NY where Irv and I could host you both in NY and in Vermont". The idea shocked us with it's audacity - high jinks in NY, our mouths both metaphorically and literally dropped open. There was a very long pause before Di remarked, "Jim and I would simply love it" - Di, ever was and still is, the enthusiast. The rest of us were put on the spot thinking 'well if she can travel from Australia to the US, we'll be sissies if we refuse to get there from the UK?' Slowly each one of us admitted it was an extremely attractive idea. The beginning of October was chosen because this is the time that 'leaf peepers' come to see the autumn colours in Vermont.

From the first Rosemary led us, drip feeding us ideas by means of emails. As time went on she tactfully nipped at the laggard's heels. The class of 1958 is not totally out of touch with the techniques of modern communication, though in my case, I limp along, gnashing my teeth, as my computer deskills me time and time again. However, there was a plus side to computer failure – I did get the cheapest New York hotel accommodation by phoning!

New York was such an exciting place for us all – culture and shopping during the day and elegant meals hosted by Rosemary and husband Irvin at night. Rosemary's choice of restaurants was impeccable and our meals were quite delicious – positively not a mouthful tasted like a school lunch in the 1950s. For one evening, the dress code was 'cocktail dresses and men in suits', which put us on our mettle and many an eye catching little number was bought.

Celia, looking stunning and fit, gave us one of our biggest surprises saying "I think I better sit down now and rest my two new hips." Wheeler has honed her ex-head girl public speaking skills and gave a hilarious thank you speech after the meal was over.

Shopping for some centred around the search for Tummy Tuck jeans called "Not Your Daughter's Jeans"! These were billed as 'less controlling' and therefore, more comfortable for the grandmothers that we all are. Rosemary, the amazing woman that she is, spent her time working while we spent our time sight seeing in NY, and she was heard saying when our visit was nearly at an end "Well I'm off to Bloomingdales tomorrow to get myself a pair of those jeans with sparkles, cos if Di has sparkles I think I better have sparkles."

Rosemary and husband Irv showed dedication and great stamina when driving us to their Vermont home. A seven and a half hour drive each way is no mean feat when you are driving a rented minibus (Rosemary) and heroic when you drive a four wheel drive vehicle (Irv) which is piled high with luggage with two strangers at your side and you are 85 years old and about to have a serious heart operation. Vermont's scenery and colouring were splendid. The highlight of our visits to Rosemary's very attractive house was the display of old school magazines plus items of school uniform. It was so funny to read about Janet and Katherine Pilcher getting their gym colours aged 11 years. We were reminded of former hilarity in class with Miss Brown (English teacher) when Janet reread out her poem/ blank verse account of advertisements of that era. Irv gave me great pleasure with his sayings and account of the button he is prone to wear which says "Repeal the XIX Amendment" - for those not in the know, the XIX Amendment to the Constitution of the United States reads "The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." We stayed in the Feather Bed Inn, which was a delight with it's enormous feather filled duvets plumped up in the middle of old fashioned style beds. What a contrast the inn was to our previous room two stories of wood panelled rooms and stairs, a folksy style with the most appetising breakfasts.

As we neared our destination, after the trip to Vermont, the downside of New York character was evident. We went into a gas station and our intrepid driver Rosemary joined the queue and moved with great difficulty towards the petrol pumps. The gas station was on a corner and there were in-coming and out going taxis and cars from both streets. We became boxed in at the pumps. Just as the pump became free a car screeched forward in front of us and we halted bonnet to bonnet, but they were nearer to the pump. Invectives of varying degrees of strength were hurled at the occupants of the car. We realised that we could be the centre of a total impasse if yet more cars lined up in front of us. With true grit and nerve Di flew to the offending motor and with non-aggressive body language asked them why the heck they were where they were. She then held up further away drivers, which did the trick.

I think the reunion was all about renewing and reviving relationships. It was a joy to be able to remember old times and to translate the intimate knowledge we had of each other as teenagers. Gone was the elasticity of youth – we had been pinned down by titles such as 'mother', 'wife' etc. We learnt to appreciate and admire what we had made of our lives. FHS may have played an important part in our early development but there was such a lot to catch up on and it was a fantastic setting and time to do it in. We owe Rosemary and Irv a huge debt of gratitude."

Reminiscences Famous School Visitors



When I cast my mind back, at the time of the HRH visit, over the past twenty-eight years – a tiny time compared with Mrs Forde's – quite a number of names came flooding back of the great and the good who have passed beneath the Polished Corners' portal.

Not a few of these guests had kindly agreed to judge the annual Drama Competition, still a very important part of the school year, which has for a few years now been brilliantly judged by Polished Corners who are not only making great successes of their lives but have given the girls wise, welcome and positive advice. They have been superb role models. Unfortunately this was not always the case in the past.

Miss Holt was delighted to have secured, as judge, one year, a well known actor who shall remain nameless, as they say, but for whom she had a great admiration. Equally famous for his diction and capacity for drink, he deserted Miss Holt's official lunch to visit the pub and returned too inebriated to deliver a proper judgement. The word 'disillusioned' is not adequate to describe her reaction!

Happily the vast majority of our famous judges did a very good job – Mike Newell of 'Four Weddings and a Funeral' fame, for example. He has directed many other successful films, but I have rarely known a kinder or more unassuming man. I recall finding him sitting in the corridor amid heaps of scenery, costumes and crumpled scripts on a school bench which had been pressed into service for a play set in a park, making notes on the plays for his verdict. I tried to lure him to the quiet room and pot of coffee assigned to him for this task, but there was no persuading him. 'No, no – this is where I'm happy. I'm at home here'. And there he stayed until he delivered his excellent evaluation and presented the well deserved prizes.

Another group of famous visitors includes those who have been kind enough to speak to the Sixth Form or the whole school, including, just to pick a few, Jonathan Miller, Boris and his father Stanley Johnson, Margaret from 'The Apprentice' and Tom Stoppard. The latter was excellent, but paced the Lecture Theatre back and forth while speaking in such a way that the only pearls of wisdom most of his audience were able to catch were the ones that dropped from his lips as he reached the middle of the area where he was speaking!

I have mentioned before how the cloakrooms chose to flood with raw sewage just as Esther Rantzen arrived to speak. She sat quite calmly in the front hall surrounded by the screeching of every alarm in the building. I am not sure whose sang-froid was the greater, hers, or ours for transporting her safely and with no evidence of panic to the Lecture Theatre, mercifully at an Olympian distance from the Hades that was the cloakroom!

Such luminaries are rarely demanding in matters of sustenance, but I do vividly remember Lord Hailsham, sporting his specially made button boots, arriving when we hosted the Observer Mace debating finals. It was very important to get in exactly the right blend of single malt Scotch whisky for him. Failing to do this was not an option.

The heroes who have hosted school events for us have included Jim Carter, Des O'Connor and Loyd Grossman. Des O'Connor coped manfully when one of those pesky bottles of Highland Spring that take ages to get open and then explode in your face disgorged its ENTIRE foaming contents all over him as he ran an auction on stage in the Hall! I was, as you can imagine, really intimidated when a French food hamper I had made up for a raffle was won by Loyd Grossman of all people! The family was very nice about the home made quiche.....

The Millennium event was graced by Lord and Lady Longford, Griff Rhys Jones and Posy Simmonds, among others. Posy drew a cartoon on one of the old style white teaching boards while giving a talk which was sadly later rubbed off – we should have framed and kept it.

Memorable as ever is the visit of the Bishop and the Actress, the Bishop of London and Joan Collins, to open the swimming pool and new wing of that time. Just a little liquid on the surface of the floor covering the pool made the Bishop appear to be walking on water as he crossed it!

These are just a few of the many fascinating visitors who have been good enough to spare some time to contribute to the girls' education. Many also have passed the door of the Gloucester Arms in its former incarnation, not least Hattie Jacques, Hughie Green and John Le Mesurier whose spirits undoubtedly remain now that the other sort have been permanently removed from the shelves!

In 1947 the then royal family King George, Queen Elizabeth, Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret Rose toured South Africa. Our Class at FHS averaging 13 years of age were encouraged to make scrap books of this historic event. I grouped with Juliet Raphael and Stina Soderberg. We chose a charcoal grey book, stencilled in white lettering the towns and dates and then edged in red and gold each photo or article. We avariciously gathered all photos, maps and articles in all newspapers eg the Illustrated London News, Tatler etc. We revelled in our treasures as we discussed the layout and effects. Of course we had an index and several maps setting out the route. Soon we knew the places like the back of our hands. Finally our group was awarded the class prize. There has been just one drawback: I cannot erase the old town names from my mind and my geography is hopelessly confused. I would add to you personally that I have visited South Africa, but am still quite hazy!

There were not many famous visitors in the fifties that I remember. We were supposed to have an annual lecture paid for by The Hare lecture fund, established by the architect of the school building who gave his fee for this purpose. But it was invested in some thing that did not do well, and so it lapsed... The few talks were of a charitable nature. Junior school staff came back to tell us of their missionary works in Africa, as several went to teach abroad after leaving the junior school. A lady from Barnardos told about the work of the charity at that time, in running full time residential homes for children who did not have parents who could care for them. We were made to feel deeply privileged. We all had Barnardos collecting boxes in the junior school.

Then in the senior school I recall a visit from someone in the Foreign Office, who gave more of a careers talk aimed at "girls from nice backgrounds" being the sort the Foregn Office might wish to admit. Even then it seemed to be a little hilarious. I wonder who the good lady concerned managed to recruit or put off!!

Perhaps there was a different attitude to fame, I think it was more a question of what people did, and example and perhaps duty. There were two well known elderly Old Girls, Enid Moberly Bell, daughter of a former editor of the Times, who wrote biographies and the first history of the school, and Albertine Winer, a doctor who was involved in starting the Hospice movement. We met them because the senior school was invited to the Old Girls' Tea Party, on the school birthday. In retrospect perhaps we should have made more of these encounters.

China. Even after four months of being completely immersed in every aspect of Chinese life I still feel I only scratched the surface.

I arrived at the beginning of January, the coldest time of year, and to my body (used to the tropical temperatures of Madagascar where I had been only a few weeks before) it felt like being thrown in liquid nitrogen. Though I had been mentally prepared for these temperatures it was still a shock. Arriving at Beijing airport I was worried and amused to find that rather than the usual lingerie adverts they were advertising long underwear instead. Just how cold was it going to be?!

Every Monday to Friday I had lessons in the morning at a wonderful language school located right next to Tian'anmen Square. It was a bit of a trek to get there from the hostel where I was living near Sanlitun. Though I took the subway on the first day, I chose to walk after that as it meant I could explore a large area of Beijing that most people never have the time to visit. My numerous walks encompassed a large number of hutongs (the 'slums' of Beijing). Even with my big coat and covering of nearly every exposed part of me, my walk to school was brisk as I tried to stay warm. It was fine until the wind blew and then it ate into me. As I walked along with the wind behind me, it was hilarious to see everyone walking towards me suddenly hop around and stop completely, or walk backwards whenever a gust of wind came, to stop the cold hurting their faces. It was like everyone was in a comic dance as they all simultaneously turned away and then turned back again in unison. Walking into the wind, it felt like walking into a hand pushing me back and I had to walk semi-blind with only one eye occasionally peering ahead and then retreating behind my mittens. Or I employed the Chinese technique of turning my back and waiting. The moisture from my breath condensed on my eyelashes, and when I reached school it looked as though I was wearing sparkling mascara, and everywhere I looked was haloed with rainbows, a pretty cool experience even if it did quickly melt away.

Beijing was dusty and dry. During my three months in the capital it rained only a couple of times, and before that it had been dry for nearly five months. The drought in the north of China is a big concern. The pollution wasn't as bad as I had feared it would be. Though there were days where I could see the grime hanging in the air, it was bearable.

so I had a week off school to do lots of sightseeing and a chance to see the legendary Chinese celebrations. The fireworks were plentiful, all I had to do was step out of my hostel to be surrounded by fire and light. They were being set off the tops of buildings, out of windows and in the street. Looking up and down, the road was one big display and the noise was definitely loud enough to drive off evil spirits, believe me!

After an amazing three months in Beijing I then travelled to Chengdu (home of the giant pandas and the giant Buddah of Leshan) followed by a longish drive to Bifengxia, a nature reserve with a panda base containing over seventy giant pandas, where I would live for the next month.

China is so vast that the move from Beijing to Bifengxia was like travelling to a different country. It was much more like the China I had expected to see. The lush mountainous landscape and clean moist air were a very welcome change and the people were hugely different, being more open and curious about foreigners, as most of them had never been out of the province.

As a foreigner in Beijing I had attracted a fair bit of attention. But since I was mainly there in winter, I was normally swathed in layers with my hair covered by my hood. By the time I arrived in Bifengxia it was the beginning of April and with no hood to hide beneath I attracted almost more attention than the pandas! That is saying something. To say that the Chinese are besotted with pandas would be an understatement. At the weekend busloads of middle-aged Chinese would pour into the centre screaming like fans at a film premier and ignoring the various signs telling them to 'keep shhhh!'.

I was helping the keepers with general panda care and research. The mornings were filled with sweeping, feeding and faeces. A panda's diet consists of lots of bamboo, and the occasional apple or carrot. A little known fact is that pandas are not entirely restricted to eating bamboo, they are able to eat a range of foods, though in the wild they are normally only able to find eggs and baby birds in addition to the typical bamboo. Each panda had a different personality. Some were very dopey and docile so that I could get close and give them a good scratch (though always with bars in between). Others never let me forget that they were bears. One of them called Bai Xue (meaning white snow) was quite the escape artist. She is now older than me and hasn't got many teeth left, but a couple of years ago she managed to climb out of her enclosure and was a wild bear for over three

I was lucky that my trip coincided with the Chinese New Year years. She eluded helicopter searches and only returned when she wanted to, a little thin but otherwise fine. Jin Zhu (golden bamboo) was another of my favourites. She always seemed to be hungry even though she was given more food than the others. If she saw me walking by she would get very excited. and if I were carrying food, she would hurtle into her inner den and wait for me with her mouth wide open. Her hunger was only comparable to Ling Ling's, a big male who never let me forget that I was there to serve him. If in the morning I wasn't guite fast enough cleaning his enclosure and feeding him, he would take a piece of bamboo between his teeth and play it along the bars until I gave him his breakfast.

> It was satisfying to help the keepers with whom I became very close. Their dedication to the pandas was touching and it was lucky that I was conversational in Chinese as they spoke almost no English. The people at the centre were all lovely, and when the crowds came they would act as bodyguards and help keep the people and their cameras away from us. The problem was that if I agreed to pose with one group I would then be swarmed. At one point I had over twenty cameras pointing at me with queues of people waiting their turn. Their curiosity surprised me as I thought that they would have been used to seeing western people on television if not in the flesh.

> The money from my Quondam travel fund paid for my food and accommodation so that I could volunteer my time freely. As it happened I had arrived right in the middle of the panda breeding season. This meant that not only did I have the delight of being with over a dozen 5-6 month-old baby pandas, but I was involved in the fascinating process of panda mating. Myth would have you believe that they are completely incompetent but this is not true. I was very lucky to have been around at this time.

> My four months in China went amazingly fast. At times it was difficult being such an obvious foreigner and having to adjust to such an alien life, but it was worth it. Would I have done it any other way? Not for all the tea in China.

Liz Eccleshare 19 October 1921 – 8 May 2009

William Eccleshare, son, writes:

Liz Eccleshare, who has died aged 87, was an inspirational history teacher, a gregarious member of a north London liberal intellectual network and a dominant figure in the lives of generations of pupils, friends and family.

The eldest daughter of two Cambridge academics, Joan and Stanley Bennett, Liz was born in Cambridge. She read history at Girton College in the city before marrying the publisher Colin Eccleshare. They moved to London after the second world war.

Their home in Branch Hill, Hampstead, was the centre of an energetic family life where their four children were brought up, and where an endless stream of friends and relatives were entertained generously. Liz's lifelong commitment to good food was reflected in her Encyclopedia of World Cookery. published in 1958 (under the pseudonym Elizabeth Campbell) and reprinted nine times.

Her teaching career took her from private crammer to innercity comprehensive. She joined Westminster Tutors in 1958, where she coached for the Oxbridge entrance exams, with a consistently high success rate.

In her late 40s, she entered the classroom, first at Godolphin and Latymer, then at Francis Holland, and finally as head of department at Camden School for Girls, where she had previously been both a parent and governor. In her 14 years there, she welcomed the school's change to comprehensive status and led the development of the curriculum to mixedability teaching. With a distinctive, gravelly smoker's voice and a fierce but good-humoured manner, she brought a rigour and intelligence to her lessons that few forgot.

In retirement, my mother remained as busy as ever. She took further degree courses at Birkbeck College in art history, worked for the National Trust at two of their sites -Sutton House in Hackney, and the Ernö Goldfinger house in Hampstead. In her last years she returned to Camden school to bring order to its archives, a project she continued until her death. She kept up her wide circle of friends and made countless new ones from every generation. At a packed celebration of her life at Kenwood House on Hampstead Heath, all were struck by the wide age range of the guests.

The sole driver in the family, she would cover thousands of miles a year in pursuit of good company and beautiful places. Few Morris Travellers can have gone a greater distance with more people across rougher terrain. Holidays were spent in corners of the west coast of Scotland or at our cottage near Dolgellau in Wales. Days were filled with a schedule of outings, picnics, wonderful cakes and intensely competitive games of Scrabble. Colin died in 1989. Their eldest daughter, Judith, was killed in a cycling accident in 1967. Liz is survived by Sarah, Julia and myself, 11 grandchildren and one greatgranddaughter.

Sophie was a confident, loving and caring person who was taken in her prime at the age of twenty-eight. She will be sadly missed by all those who knew her.

Sophie was tragically killed in a mid-air collision last August when she was on the approach to Coventry Airport. Sophie was being trained for a new contract to calibrate instrument landing systems by the pilot in command.

Sophie was a keen musician. She was awarded the music scholarship in 1991 at Francis Holland School. She achieved grade eight violin, grade eight piano and grade five oboe. She was a lover of animals, for this reason she became a vegetarian at the age of eight, a decision that she never went back on. After studying A levels Sophie went to study Law at Nottingham University where she graduated in 2003. Sophie had a large circle of friends. She played in the University Orchestra and was a committee member of the Gliding Club.

Having learnt to fly at Denham Aerodrome she went on to study for her Airline Transport Pilot Licence written exams which she passed at the first attempt. Having gained some more flying experience at Derby Airfield she completed her Commercial Pilot Licence, Instrument Rating and Instructor Rating all in a year, which is a big achievement. All her flying tests were passed on the first attempt.

Having instructed at Derby Airfield on single engine aeroplanes for two years she went on to fly multi engine aeroplanes at Coventry. The flying there was interesting ranging from mapping for OS to transporting fighter pilots from one base to another. She really enjoyed her job and was well on the way to becoming an airline pilot, her life long ambition.

Only two days before she died she had just completed a multi-engine instructor rating course so she could pass her knowledge and experience on to others.

Sophie Hastings was one of the most inspiring of Polished Corners. Her passing was tragic and her short life packed with enough meaning and interest for the lives of three people. She achieved many things, met many people and tried to unravel those aspects of life that are mysterious and even inexplicable.

While at Francis Holland, Sophie, a lover of animals as well as a lifelong vegetarian, had two cats, Spot and Claira, whom she loved. She had been awarded the FHS Music Scholarship when she was ten, auditioning on the violin and the piano and achieving Grade Eight with distinction in both instruments. Also an oboist, Sophie participated very fully in school music, playing in quartets, orchestra and singing in the choirs. Sophie played with the National Children's Main Orchestra at concert venues such as Ripon Cathedral and the Birmingham Symphony Hall.

I personally remember clearly Sophie's enjoyment of one of the Classics Department's trips to Greece. She felt that King Agamemnon was guite right to build his palace in such beautiful surroundings as we saw at Mycenae, and loved being able to stay outside in the warm evenings. A photograph exists, which I remember being posed by Mrs.Wood, of Sophie and friends having fun while demonstrating how Greek athletes might have stood while throwing the discus, javelin etc. She also sang informally in the ancient theatre at Epidauros, universally known for acoustics so extraordinary that spectators at the top of the auditorium can hear a pin drop on stage – and many stopped to listen to the beauty of the sound that resulted from this impromptu performance.

Sophie lives on in so many hearts and places, and will always be remembered at Francis Holland, where her life also continues in those of the current pupils as they learn, go to Greece and Knapp House and play the wonderful music that is so much part of the school. Sophie's mother Pat has very kindly given us the Sophie Hastings Bowl, to be presented in her memory to a junior violinist who shows real potential and who has already made an excellent contribution to the school. The first winner is Srutti Suresan in the LIV.

It is the hope of Pat Hastings that the trophy awarded in Sophie's name, in her old school, will encourage young violinists to work hard to explore their strengths and gifts as musicians so as to enrich their own and others' lives, and if this is the result of the trophy award, Sophie's memory will thus be honoured.
