

Your successors here at the school can boast of innumerable achievements, adventures and experiences. They enjoy life in an environment which is both academic and kind. The warmth of spirit and the buzz of a busy, urban day school are both still very much in evidence here – just as I hope you will agree they have always been. If you have the chance to visit us again perhaps at the Quondam AGM on 4th November or during 2018, I am certain that you will feel proud of Francis Holland School, just as I do.

Here is some news about developments at your school over the last twelve months. A period in which we have been working to prepare pupils for the world of the future — the world which they will inhabit.

At the centre of what we do, and rightly so, is teaching and learning. Within this topic area have been new leadership opportunities for girls, the introduction of

Philosophy to the Lower Fourth curriculum, a renewed lecture programme and, significantly, a new system of frequent progress cards. This has been a year when the teachers have considered how a "growth mindset" can enable our pupils to reach yet higher heights; how the language that we use and the subtle messages which we send out can challenge and inspire our pupils to succeed.

This year we have also sought to make the most of our prime central London location; twelve visits for each tutor group in the Lower Fourth took place, there were also twenty theatre trips and we shared a venue with our very good friends at Francis Holland, Sloane Square for a magnificent joint concert.

Francis Holland is a confident school which is bold enough to reach beyond the school gates, to welcome guests and to seek partnerships. In terms of being ever more outward-looking, a strengthening of the Help Fund has taken place to great success, moreover the volunteering programme has been relaunched and I am delighted to say that our "Entrepreneurship Fortnight" in November was enormously positive. It challenged girls to look beyond the typical careers which might be considered and to imagine themselves setting up their own business. Indeed, possibly inspired by the initiative, this year's three Young Enterprise groups were more successful than ever before!

Back in March we hosted an event with Mark Carney the Governor of the Bank of England as a launch for the school's vision of a "new spirit of internationalism". Perhaps the most striking proposal is the French house project which is now taking shape, but the exchange programme with a school in Manhattan and the introduction of a gap year student from New Zealand were also noteworthy initiatives.

Francis Holland School remains an extremely successful and highly-sought after independent girls' day school in London. The school has countless strengths, not least its dedicated staff, its impressive cohort of pupils and its alumni network.

In mentioning our staff, I am delighted to include that my predecessor, Vivienne Durham, has been appointed as the new Chief Executive of the Girls' Schools Association; see page 12 for a full article. I am also pleased to read all the terrific memories you have submitted for Felicity Forde; her donation of a Senior Cup for Netball is a lasting reflection of her contribution to Francis Holland and we are thankful for all she has done.

Next year we will be celebrating the school's 140th birthday. There will be opportunities for you to re-engage with Francis Holland School - details to follow. I would be delighted to meet as many of you as possible over the coming year and please do not leave it until the 150th. After all, this is The Finest School in London!





This year we have had to say goodbye to two long-serving members of staff. More sadly, I was so sorry we have included the first obituary from a pupil from my own year. Some lovely memories have been penned about Sue Winter and her achievements both at school and afterwards.

Thank you all for sending us your own news, which we do so enjoy reading. I hope these are enjoyed by all, especially when they trigger more memories of your own. As I mentioned above, the school database of contact details

As someone who has always been a complete disaster at sport and I mean all sport with a capital S, I really shouldn't have such fond memories of Felicity Forde but for some reason I do. I remember her arrival at school, I was 11 years old and just starting life in the Senior School after what seemed like six long years in the Junior School. I was feeling grown up and more confident,

well that is with everything apart from PE.

I can't begin to count the amount of times that my poor mother had to cajole me out of bed in the mornings on gym days when I had horrendous stomach aches – real or possibly imagined – and my older sister Alexandra still reminds me too often of the shame and embarrassment she felt one day at being made to go to the front of the coach on its way to Seymour Baths where I was being sick at the thought of the imminent dreaded swimming lesson. Through it all Miss Dennis, who then became Mrs Forde, tried to encourage me with her enthusiasm and love for all types of sport. Okay so I was last in the swimming gala (I guess it didn't help me walking slowly down the steps whilst the rest of the class jumped or dived in before it started!) or that I was normally picked last for most of the team games. I even remember once being made Goal Shooter in a netball match which is great as I still haven't quite made it to being

At this point I should add that I wasn't the only sporting failure in my family, my sister, the aforementioned Alexandra (Martyn née Moss) failed every BAGA Gym award that she ever took and

then subsequently became a teacher and passed every BAGA Gym teaching qualification!

When my niece Victoria Arad (née Martyn) started at the school more than twenty years later and told Mrs Forde who she was, she was greeted apparently by Felicity Forde with the immortal words "you can't be related to Alexandra and Juliet Moss because you are good at sport!"

I wish Mrs Forde well in her retirement and think of her fondly when I go swimming virtually every single week and swim my weekly mile – okay so it does take me a considerable length of time to swim it and I am still walking rather slowly down the steps but I would like to thank her for her dedication and patience when helping this most unsporty of pupils!

Jenny Isaacson (née Jaffa) 1982

I always loved PE at school and Mrs Forde played a very important role in my years at FHS. I remember gymnastics in the gym with the very old-fashioned box-like vault, the ropes attached to the ceiling, and climbing frames that could extend out from the walls. I remember taking (and passing) BAGA awards in the gym (and I still have my four badges!). I was always disappointed when it rained and we had to take PE in the gym, but Mrs Forde always made it a lot of fun; we played circle games like "Fishes in the Sea", and Mrs Forde would tap each one of us on the head, designating us "cod, haddock, plaice and salmon" and then call out instructions like "high tide", "low tide", "tide turns" and the inevitable "sea settles" whereupon you sprinted back to your seat in the circle hoping not to be the last one to sit down. Mrs Forde also built elaborate courses using all of the





apparatus and you had to navigate your way around the gym without touching the floor, otherwise you were out.

I played netball, hockey, rounders and tennis, and we were always on tenterhooks to see who would get selected for the teams and in what position. Mrs Forde would post handwritten lists on bulletin boards, usually outside the staff room, and it would be a mad dash to see who had made the cut. I'm sure there's a much more high-tech way of doing this now, but amazingly, when I visited last May and Mrs Forde kindly took me on a tour of the school, we reminisced about our matches. She then disappeared into the staff room and came out a few minutes later with lists from some of our games. They brought back very happy memories so I took a few photos as well as one of me and Mrs Forde to whom I am enormously grateful for being such a wonderful teacher and inspiration during my time at FHS. Thank you Mrs Forde! I wish you the happiest of retirements.

Ruth Logue (née Clifton Samuel) 1983

I'll never forget our PE lessons in Regent's Park especially running/jogging around the outer/inner circle at least three times!

Ros Heath (née Leach) 1984



When I think back three years to my time in Bolivia it really pulls at my heartstrings. I dedicated my gap year to learning Spanish, and although I did not leave totally fluent, it was a great basis for taking on the language academically alongside my degree, Anthropology. It sounds horribly cheesy but besides an ability to show off en Español, my gap year opened my eyes to how inconceivably huge the world is. I expected to experience extreme poverty, what I did not expect was the uncomfortable feeling of being somewhere so completely unfamiliar. Moving to Bolivia came with a whole new etiquette, different food habits, hobbies and even silly things like learning how to use the washing machine. Adjusting was tough and I understand why in our everyday society we gravitate towards like-minded people with similar backgrounds. We know that this "natural gravitation" is not always a good

thing and actually one of the root causes of a segregated society. I frequently fall into the same trap at university: labelling students from overseas as "international" and generally expecting them to live and eat together, separate from the "national" students. They are perfectly happy, but maybe not achieving what they had intended by moving to the UK to study.

ICS took me to Bolivia, and this summer I will be working with NCS, a national charity that seeks social integration within the UK. NCS places young people out of their comfort zones and with people from different backgrounds in a fourweek residential programme of various activities. TRIBUTE TO SUE WINTER (1954 - 2017)

When my sister called me to say that she was going to the Royal Marsden Hospital to have a biopsy, I never imagined that 16 months later I would be writing this obituary.

The old girls and teachers who knew Sue will in all probability not remember her for her academic successes or ambitions but for her sense of fun, energy and forthright nature. When Sue left Francis Holland she embarked on a very successful career in politics as a Conservative agent. In 1974 she made history as being the youngest political agent in the country, trying to secure a seat for John Major on his first attempt to become an MP. With that experience behind her she was then instrumental in winning Fulham and Hammersmith, a constituency long held by Labour. Never one for having a comfortable and 'boring' life, Sue ditched politics for television. Initially she was briefly in front of the camera and then behind, where she enjoyed researching and coproducing documentaries that took her around the world for several years.

Sue's life changed dramatically when she adopted two children but in spite of the demands of such a huge commitment she reinvented herself yet again and helped many disadvantaged children and their families in her role as a mentor at a local primary school. Following this she set up the Wandsworth branch of Home-Start, a charity to support families with young children during difficult and challenging times.

When Sue became ill one of her biggest problems, other than dealing with her illness, was managing her diary because friends, old and new, were queuing up to visit or give a helping hand. Sadly, although she was always positive and determined from the outset to beat the odds, it was not enough. She will be fondly remembered by many and I do hope that the old girls will raise a glass in her memory at the next annual Quondam Lunch.

QUONDAM TRAVEL SCHOLARSHIP 2016

In 2016, Amy Fass travelled to Sri Lanka to volunteer with a children's charity.



Thanks to the generous support of Quondam I was able to travel to Sri Lanka this summer with six other Lancaster medical students. We were aiming to set up a new branch of SKIP. SKIP stands for Students for Kids International Projects. It is a student led charity which helps support children's welfare in developing countries. SKIP currently has branches across eleven UK universities each of which work with a non-government organisation (NGO) in Europe, Asia or Africa. The aim is to develop a sustainable community-based project focusing on the health and education of local children.



As the newest SKIP branch, Lancaster's trip to Sri Lanka involved visiting four NGOs in Colombo, Kandy and the tea plantations of Dickoya. The aim was to visit each of these charities to see which one would be the most suitable partner for SKIP Lancaster. Over the coming year we will work with the chosen NGO to establish our healthcare project and in 2017 we hope to be able to send students from Lancaster University to volunteer on the project over the summer.

The four NGOs that we visited were Child Action Lanka, The Paalam International School, Lanka Mother and Child and the Cerebral Palsy Lanka Foundation. Child Action Lanka and The Paalam International School are two NGOs that work with street and disadvantaged children.

Both NGOs are attempting to break the cycle of poverty by providing these children with an education which they would otherwise not have been given. During our time with these NGOs we were given the opportunity to run some interactive first aid sessions. In small groups we taught the children basic life support, the recovery position and what to do if an adult or child is choking. This was a fantastic experience for us and it was really rewarding to see the children practising their new skills at the end of the sessions. We also ran some teaching sessions on infectious diseases, for example dengue fever, which is highly prevalent in Sri Lanka. We focused predominately on how to identify its symptoms and the management of the disease. We were also able to learn from the children as many of them had themselves contracted dengue fever.

The third NGO, Lanka Mother and Child, focuses on improving the lives of the children of the Dickoya tea plantation workers. Amongst

this community there are high levels of poverty and alcoholism and children often leave school at a very young age. We were given the opportunity to visit the NGO's child development centres, which provide a safe and educational environment for pre-school children whilst their parents are at work. We also learnt about the medical camps and nutritional programmes organised by this NGO. This experience provided us with a good background knowledge of the problems these children face and how SKIP Lancaster could potentially get involved with this predominately isolated community in the future.

The final NGO we visited was the Cerebral Palsy Lanka Foundation. Cerebral palsy is a physical disability that affects movement and posture and it is estimated to affect 40,000 children in Sri Lanka. This is currently the only charity in Sri Lanka that helps children with cerebral palsy. We visited one of the charity's "dream centres" with the view that Lancaster students could potentially volunteer at the centre next summer. The centre provides the children with both education and therapy (occupational, speech and physiotherapy).



Whilst in Sri Lanka, we also took the opportunity to explore this fantastic country; visiting the elephants at Minneriya National Park, exploring the temples in Dambulla and the beaches in Mount Lavina.
