From the Headmaster

At this time of year, schools across the country turn their attention towards A levels and GCSEs. For other pupils too much of the talk is of end of year tests. Here at Francis Holland School, the official exam week comes just before half term. It will be an intense week and it will require hard work. The purpose of this week of tests is to prepare younger girls for the rigour of public examinations and to help them develop good habits that will benefit them as they progress further up the school. The timing of our exam week allows pupils to knuckle down to serious work between Easter and Whitsun, but without the need to revise over the half term break – there will be school holidays in the years to come when much work will be required, but this is not the case yet! I know that many girls have been working hard on revision and I wish them every success. Results will be sent out to parents in mid-June.

The second half of the summer term has much to recommend it to the girls. The Junior Play, Sports Day and the annual Art Exhibition are always highlights. This year, however, we have a new initiative which is running throughout the school and which should ensure that the last week of the summer term becomes the most memorable time of the year – every year:

- The Thirds are off to the Chateau du Baffy in Normandy for an activity week.

- The Lower Fourth have Science Week here in school, including the long-established Science Fair for parents on the Wednesday evening.
- The Upper Fourth have a water sports trip to Knapp House in Devon; this trip has been running for nearly thirty years and we know the staff and the centre very well.
- The Lower Fifth are almost all away in France, Germany, Italy or Spain depending on which modern language they have chosen to study for GCSE; a tiny handful of girls have opted for work experience instead.
- The Upper Fifth will all be on work experience that week; some will be working in London, others will be elsewhere in the UK or internationally.
- The Lower Sixth are in lessons all week and the school has made sure that at least one specialist teacher from every subject department is in London that week to deliver their lessons and to prepare them for the summer holidays and for university applications.
- The Upper Sixth will probably be watching Wimbledon, dancing at a music festival or relaxing on the beaches of the Mediterranean enjoying a well-deserved rest after finishing their A levels.

All of these activities are planned to cover the period from Monday to Thursday of the last week of the summer term. The whole school (minus the two exam years) will come back together on the Friday for our end of term service and assembly, complete with many celebrations and some important farewells.

The most important thing that we do in school is to deliver excellent lessons week in week out – it is the bread and butter of school life. Outstanding teaching and learning is our top priority. That said, there is always room for excitement and for making memories that will last a lifetime.

The school is in good heart.

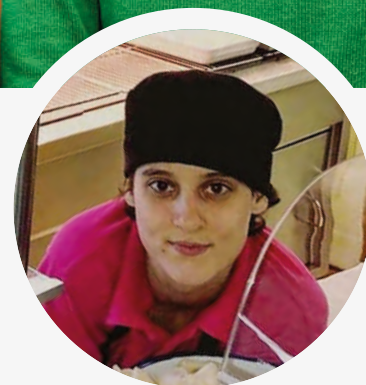

Inter-House Debating Final

On Friday 4th April, the whole school gathered to question whether 'men and women should compete in sport together as equals', the subject for this year's Inter-House Debating Final. We were joined by authors Isabelle Duncan and Bill Colegrave, who came to FHS to judge this 'hot topic' debate in front of the whole school.

Isabelle is a cricketer, coach, and BBC Radio commentator, and sits on the Committee at the Marylebone Cricket Club at Lord's. She has had an illustrious career as a cricketer often captaining 'male' teams. Bill is a travel writer and himself reached the final of the world's largest debating competition, the ESU MACE, so is an experienced debater.

Issy Klug and Eleni Papanayotou (Upper Fifth) argued the case for the Proposition representing Jupiter, with

Bella Atfield (Upper Fifth) and Tegan Macpherson (Lower Fifth) in Opposition on behalf of Saturn. As with all the best debates, the tough questions from the Floor fuelled the speakers' passion, and we were treated to an exceptional contest. Former school debating champions Nula Kenzie and Scarlett Field-Green were amongst the dozen or so girls to put the summary speakers to task.

After the Debate our Chairperson, Eva Perez (Lower Sixth), who has been Senior Debating Captain this year, conducted a floor vote, which came out just in favour of the Opposition. The Junior Debating Captain, Claudia Limaverde Costa (Lower Fourth), acted as the Debate's Timekeeper and supported Eva brilliantly. Then it was the turn of our judges to take to the stage!

Bill and Isabelle told us something of their own experiences with debating – Bill shared an anecdote about finding confidence from nowhere when speaking to hundreds at the Royal Geographical Society, and Isabelle told us something of the challenges of often being the only woman in a boardroom making decisions for the benefit of women.

Our judges were full of praise for all our brave speakers, but on the occasion it was Issy and Eleni who triumphed and received the Debating Spoon prize. Our judges gave all girls involved signed copies of their books, and the school library got a copy too. We are extremely grateful to them for their generosity of time and advice for life.

Sixth Form Trips in London (and Webinars!)

Over the past half term the Sixth Form have been busy exploring their subjects to new, deeper levels and gleaning exam tips at a range of conferences and events here in London.

Historians attended a series of lectures related to the Russian Revolution by Dr Simon Dixon and award-winning historian Dr Daniel Beer on Wednesday 5th March.

Italian linguists saw a screening of the Italian horror film *Respiri* at Regent Street Cinema on Monday 12th March, which was followed by a Q&A with the director Alfredo Fiorillo and members of the cast. They also went to visit the Estorick Collection to see a temporary exhibition on the *Making of Modern Italy*.

German students went to the A Level German Student Conference on Thursday 14th March, where they had two sessions with a chief examiner who gave tips on how to produce high quality essays, in addition to four lectures.

Not to be outdone, Spanish linguists joined in on a Webinar about essay writing presented by two facilitators who work as external examiners at Edexcel on Tuesday 19th March.



Geographers heard from Professor Loretta Lees of Leicester University on the subject of the gentrification of London on Monday 18th March.

Biologists enjoyed a trip to the world-famous Body Worlds exhibition in Piccadilly Circus, on Wednesday 20th March, where they had the opportunity to see over 200 exhibits that covered six key systems of the body: digestive, respiratory, reproductive, cardiovascular, nervous and locomotive systems.

Psychologists had an inspiring and thought-provoking day of lectures on Wednesday 27th March led by eminent Criminologist Professor David Wilson and Professor Elizabeth Loftus, who spoke about the inaccuracies of human memory and how they have led to wrongful convictions.

All in all, it's been a busy, but inspiring half term.

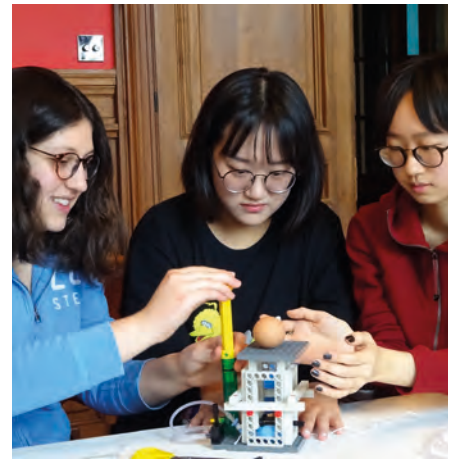
We were delighted that they agreed to join us on the trip to share their insights

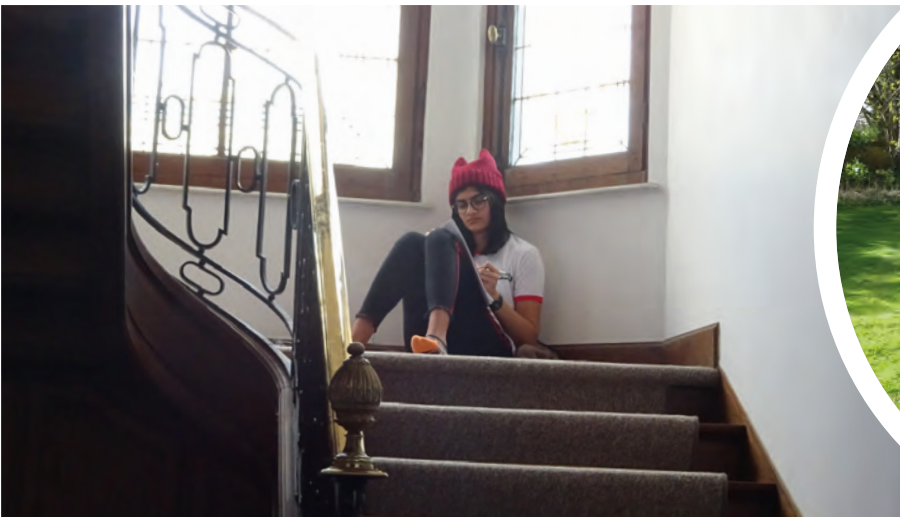
and experience with our current physicists.

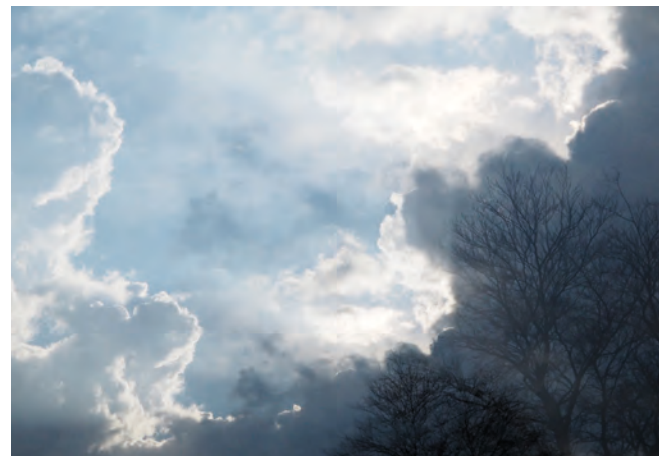


Photography Club

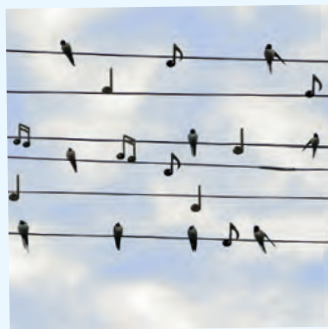
