From the Headmaster

Earlier this year, the Varkey Foundation, a global education group which is chaired in an honorary capacity by Bill Clinton and counts Bertie Ahern amongst its trustees, published a report on global attitudes towards education. The survey of 27,000 parents across 29 countries sought out cultural differences in attitudes and priorities across the globe. Some of the findings are very revealing and cast a light on the British outlook and the British school system in general.

For example, the Varkey survey showed that parents in Great Britain prioritise the importance of examination results more than any other nation. Secondly, the British parents surveyed were considerably more worried than the international average about their children growing up too early as a result of peer pressure. The third area which concerned parents here much more than others overseas was the mental wellbeing of their child. Conversely, in the area of physical health, British parents who took part in the study were less worried about the physical health of their offspring than parents in any of the other 28 countries.

Francis Holland is a wonderful school where parent satisfaction is high, as evidenced by the recent ISI inspection survey where all categories had approval ratings of well over 90%. Nevertheless, I see some of these anxieties in my role as headmaster both through my interactions with girls and with parents. As a school, we are determinedly academic and this mirrors

the national priority for examination success. As a school, we are also determinedly kind and we prioritise wellbeing of our pupils. To be known as both academic and kind can be, at times, something of a tightrope to tread, but it is the right way to be and this is one of the areas where Francis Holland distinguishes itself within its peer group of schools.

Interestingly, British parents set very little priority on schools to improving their IT and computing facilities. This may be because British schools are already generally well-equipped or it may be because British school children tend to have access to digital technologies at home. Be that as it may, I hope that parents at Francis Holland School will not be disappointed if we steer a path which continues to invest in IT. Throughout this year, teachers have been receiving training in how to make good use of technology in the classroom and all members of staff have been equipped with laptop computers. Just before Easter, we installed a new 2GB broadband connection to the school and over the summer holidays, we will upgrade our Wi-Fi provision throughout the building. At the same time we will purchase an additional set of laptop computers for use in lessons and we will take delivery of our first set of iPads, which will be available as a bookable resource for the classroom.

The strengths of this school are many, including boundless creativity, drama, music, sport, literature, practical science, studies of classics and more. Indeed, great education seldom requires young people to sit in front of a screen all day long, but where technology can help our girls to thrive and learn, and where it boosts their love of a subject and their understanding of concepts, this is where we must put IT and computers to work.

Interestingly, the Varkey study also revealed that UK parents on average spend less time helping and guiding their children with homework than is the case in almost any other nation. Although what is striking about this fact is that British parents are amongst the strongest in their belief that they offer the "right amount of time". As students at Francis Holland head towards public exams or the internal exams week, I encourage you to support them where you can, but not to overplay your role. If you sit and do all the revision with your daughter then you are not preparing her to be an independent learner. The role of a parent in her daughter's exam preparation is to provide a calm working environment, to tolerate a certain degree of grumpiness and to allow her to power forwards under her own steam.

During the Spring Term we were joined in our morning assemblies by nine inspiring and interesting women, some of whom were Polished Corners, as part of our 'Women of Influence' series.

Sue Kyd, an actress and Polished Corner who has performed numerous roles in film, theatre and television, most recently in My Fair Lady, highlighted the importance of continued learning, resilience and perseverance.

Reverend Rose Hudson-Wilkin spoke to us about her journey from a girl, growing up in Montego Bay, Jamaica, to her current role in the Church of England, describing all the challenges she had faced and overcome in the process.

Poppy Sebag-Montefiore, a freelance journalist and co-founder of Never Again International, shared five things she didn't fully understand whilst at Francis Holland, including how important feminism would still be today.

Councillor Nikkie Aiken, Conservative Leader of Westminster City Council,

talked passionately about the council's work and wider issues affecting London residents, such as housing and air pollution. She also encouraged the girls to consider a career in politics.

Dr Bev Jacobson, Chief Executive of Kisharon, inspired us by recounting her many adventures taking part in endurance races, including a marathon in Antarctica.

Rachel Lindley, Programme Manager for Five Talents, told us the stories of women her organisation has worked alongside in order to help them establish successful businesses.

Hannah Harley-Young, a Polished Corner who is one of the foremost female photographers in the UK, and has worked with a vast range of celebrities from HRH the Prince of Wales to Snoop Dog. **Diane Abbott**, MP for Hackney North and Stoke Newington and Shadow Home Secretary, spoke about her experience in British politics and "the importance of supporting and speaking up for other women".

Dr Kaili Rimfeld from King's College London shared with us her latest research comparing the genetics of twins and how they interplay with their environment to discover how human traits are (or are not) affected by differing factors.

Thank you to all of our speakers for their time and energy in bringing us such fascinating and inspirational presentations.

Sweet Water produced black cotton bags with a uniquely designed logo to substitute plastic bags and thus help to reduce the use of the default plastic alternative. They also produced small multi-use zipped bags and made a total profit of £498.15. They made it through to the next round of the competition, which was held on Thursday, 26th April at the International Law Firm BLP.

Rain produced reusable water bottles. Their final product was attractive and functional and sales were strong, helping to generate a profit of £412.70. Rain won the award for Best **Business Report!**

Perception produced a range of T-shirts with their own designs and showed a real flair for marketing – decorating the assembly Hall with advertising bunting. They made a total profit of £210.

Nova produced a series of necklaces with four pendants to represent the

different elements: Fire, Earth, Air and Water. They had some serious problems with their Chinese supplier which meant that their stock arrived late, but thanks to the support and patience of the FHS community they should be able to overcome this and expect to make enough revenue from sales to cover their costs of production.

All debates preceding the Final were extremely competitive, and many were so well attended that we had to move from the Lecture Theatre to the School Hall to seat the 80+ members of the Floor (audience).

It was very encouraging to see the manner in which the FHS girls debated, in the best of spirits, always congratulating their opponents immediately post-debate irrespective of the result or the feedback they received. I am not only very proud of all our young debaters and the high expectations they set of themselves, but also grateful for those who provided supporting roles throughout the competition: whether in form time, through friendships, or indeed by attending Senior Debating each week. Those who ask the difficult guestions from the Floor are just as valued by the Debating Society as the two teams week to week.

For the Final itself we welcomed Caroline Hyde, the Broadcast Journalist and TV Presenter (Bloomberg), as our guest judge. Having been invited to set the Final motion, with her own specialism in business and technology, Caroline opted for "This house believes robots will make the world a worse place".

Isabella Fisher Turner and Ellie Valentine (Lower Fifth) argued the

case for the Proposition, with Laura Stewart-Harris and Scarlett Field-Green (Lower Sixth) in Opposition. After a week of fervent preparation from our Debaters, the Floor were treated to an epic contest. Speeches were made, Points of Information interjected, the answering statements given, and the debate was certainly thoroughly engaging. When the Floor were asked to make their own points and questions, there were hands galore in the air, and many pertinent questions posed to the debaters. After the Debate, Caroline took to the stage to share with everyone how debating skills have helped her, not only when at school and University, but every day in her journalism career to date: choosing the key arguments, asking the right questions, maintaining civility in challenging circumstances, story-telling to captivate your audience, and many further debating disciplines that we explore in Senior Debating Society every Friday lunchtime.

Caroline was full of praise for the outstanding FHS debaters, pausing to reflect on the unglamorous but crucial role of the Final's Chairs (Alice Emlyn Jones and Yasmin Morrell) before explaining that, though it had been a hard decision, the winners were Scarlett and Laura, who addressed the key points and responded to their opponents and the Floor most effectively.



History Trip to Ypres

Seventy girls from Upper Fourth travelled to Ypres in southern Belgium on Thursday 15th March. While there we visited a number of World War I battlefields and memorials.

The highlight of the first day was our visit to the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Somme, which "commemorates more than 72,000 men of British and South African forces who died in the Somme sector before 20 March 1918 and have no known grave" (Thiepval Memorial, Commonwealth War Graves Commission). Here some of the girls were able to find the names of their ancestors amongst the fallen. We also attended a service at the Menin Gate, where the 'Last Post' is still played every evening, in memory of those soldiers who left Ypres via the gate and never returned.

On the second day we visited both British and Allied cemeteries, where we laid wreaths to remember the dead of all nations. The girls then endured a very rough crossing of the channel, which was no fun for anyone, before landing safely back in Blighty!

It was very much a production for our times, and our Upper Sixth students were riveted from start to gruesome finish, with the stage literally swimming in blood that oozes relentlessly during the last half an hour from the stricken carcass.
